Norfolk Chronicle 23 December 1786

To the memory of THOMAS STANTON, D. D.
who died at Hapton, in the county of Norfolk, Dec.
12, 1786.
OF manners cheerful, and of heart sincere,

married, at Hapton, in the same county, Mr. Robert
Brown (brother to the above Miss Brown's) to Miss
Sarah Thirtell (sister to the said Messrs. Thirtell.)

Norfolk Chronicle 20 August 1796

Yesterday was committed to the castle, by B. G.
Dillingham, and Harrod Alpe, Esqrs. Francis
Thompson, of Hingham, charged on the oath of Eli-
zabeth Jefup, of Deepham, with having about a week
since stolen and carried away ten ducks, her property.

thorpe; Jane Dawes, of Maffingham; and Ann Steele, of
Aumer.—Ann Creed, of Whiffonset, and Eliz. Garwood,
of Great Cressingham, have been severally convicted of re-
fusing to shew their yarn to the inspector, and paid the pe-
nalty.—Sarah Collison, of Hindolveston, and John Wal-
ker, of Hapton, have been severally convicted of having in
their possession wool, the property of different combers,
and paid the penalty.

Yesterday se'nnight an inquisition was taken, by Mr. Coils, at Hapton, on the body of Henry Clarke, aged 14 years, who was killed by a cart going over him.
