Norfolk Chronicle 06 October 1804

At the Quarter Sessions for this county, held on Wednesday last, Judith Parker, charged with stealing barley out of a field belonging to Mr. James Brewer, of Aylsham, was acquitted.—Thomas Gifford, for an assault on James Fennell, one of the constables of Hapton, when in the execution of his office, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment in the county goal; and Sarah Brett, for an assault on Ann Andrews, of Sparham, was sentenced to fourteen days' imprisonment in Aylsham Bridewell.

Tuesday last was married, Mr. George Hart, of Hapton, to Miss Smith, of Mulbarton.

Tuesday last, at Hapton, aged 73, Mrs. Ann Hart, wife of Mr. John Hart, formerly a respectable farmer at Scarning, in this county, and one of the people called Quakers.

Norfolk Chronicle 04 March 1809

Monday last, at Croydon, in Sutfy, in the 90th year of his age, John Partridge, Esq. fourth and only surviving son of Henry Partridge, Esq. formerly of Buckenham-house, in this county. Among other charitable bequests, he has left 100l. to the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital.

Same day, at Hapton, of a lingering decline, aged 19, Miss Tremlett, daughter of the Rev. J. Tremlett.
