James Aldis, of **Hapton**, has also been conveyed to the above Hospital, with a wound on the head.

The accident which deprived Mr. Ewen's farming-servant of his life, last Monday se'night, was owing to the too prevalent and dangerous practice of *riding on the shafts*—an offence which in this case as well as in former instances, carried with it its own immediate punishment. He was a remarkably steady man, but it being the first day of harvest, the extra liquor he had drank overpowered him, and, in endeavouring to jump off, he fell, and the wheels of the waggon passing over him, killed him on the spot.
