#### LONG STRATTON.

On the 12th instant, before W. Gwyn, Esq., and the Rev. C. H. Bayly, Darid Dale, of Flordon, labourer, was charged with committing an indecent and violent assault upon the person of Mary, the wife of John Riches, of Ashwelthorpe. From the statement of the complainant (who is the mother of seven or eight young children, and now far advanced in pregnancy) it appeared that she was going from Ashwelthorpe to Hapton, about twelve o'clock on Tuesday. The prisoner overtook her at a very lonely part of the road, and, having put a question or two to her, violently laid hold of her, threw her down by the side of the road, and assaulted her in a very brutal and disgusting manner. After a violent struggle the poor woman made her escape, and went back to Wreningham, where she gave information of the assault to police-constable Kittle, who, with police-constable Howe, succeeded in apprehending the delinquent the same evening. He was committed for trial at the next Quarter Sessions.

#### DIOCESAN SCHOOL SOCIETY.

The Rev. W. A. Ormsby read a very full and interesting report from the above society. We make the following extracts:-

From the National Society's report it appears, that while in 1847 the estimated population of England and Wales, the Isle of Man, and the Channel Islands was 17,224,148, and the total number of children under instruction in church schools, including week day. Sunday, and evening schools, was returned as 1,422,569; in 1857 the estimated population was 19,422,495, and the total number of children under instruction in church schools has been reputed to be 1,672,445; thus showing that the increase, during the last ten years, in the number of children under instruction in church schools has more than kept pace with the increase of the population. In 1847 the number of petent instresses for our national schools. The model schools, two of which are connected with the training institution as its practising schools, still maintain the position which they have long held. The Rev. F. C. Cook and the Rev. M. Mitchell, her Majesty's Inspectors, have during the past week visited the training institution, and have reported favourably of the work going on. They have also made suggestions for the improvement and increased efficiency of the institution, which will receive the attention and consideration they tennand.
